Call to Order

Committee Chair Griffin called the meeting to order at 3:05 p.m. and identified changes to the order of agenda items due to the delayed start.

Rural Health Transformation Program

Kirsten Corazzini, dean of the UNH College of Health and Human Services, presented information about the state's Rural Health Transformation (RHT) Program that seeks to expand access to affordable and innovative health care in rural areas across the state. The program is supported by an award of \$200 million per year for five years from the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), with program oversight conducted by GO-NORTH, an independent unit authorized for the purpose by the Governor's Office. Dean Corazzini described USNH's role, in partnership with CCSNH and other organizations, in building NH's health care workforce pipeline by creating a both fixed and mobile clinical education simulation network, participating in the Governor's Health Scholars Award Program, and creating education-to-career pathways that align curricula with rural workforce needs. In March 2026, the NH Executive Council approved the first cycle of \$15.6 million RHT funds to UNH on behalf of USNH, with potential allocation of \$97 million over the five years.

UNH faculty joining Dean Corazzini to present clinical simulation demonstrations were Marguerite Corvini (nursing, director of SIM core), Keri Miloro (speech-language pathology), Anne Meginnis (nursing), Jess Bacon (nursing), Gabby Petrucci (occupational therapy), and Jennifer Frye (recreational therapy, director of clinical placements).

University System Student Board (USSB)

Student trustees and USSB representatives reported on the second USSB-led forum that brought student leaders together to collaborate on shared issues systemwide and to test a repeatable feedback model for providing student insights to the Board of Trustees, a noted key role of the USSB. Building on the first forum outcomes that prioritized student communications, the second forum delved further into the topic, finding high satisfaction in the volume and accuracy of information received, but with a desire for more proactive outreach and deeper rationale for decisions being made. Actions to address the identified gaps were proposed. Chair Griffin thanked the students for their contributions, congratulated the newly graduated students, and welcomed incoming USSB representatives.

Enrollment Management Strategy

At the chair's request due to time constraints, Kim DeRego, vice provost for UNH enrollment management, focused attention on the institutions' anti-melt strategies that included direct parent engagement; individualized, multi-modal communications and outreach; sustained campus events spanning the summer; application process

milestone monitoring and high-risk melt interventions; and structured coordination, with formal anti-melt committees at UNH and PSU and campuswide assignments involving numerous functional areas at KSC.

UNH Online

Provost Riley provided an overview of plans to restructure UNH online program delivery, noting that the merger with Granite State College in 2023 did not operationally consolidate online programming offered across the university. The new UNH Online model is designed to unify undergraduate online program delivery; integrate online delivery for the Graduate School and School of Law, with active oversight of graduate program development by the relevant UNH colleges; centralize instructional design and faculty development; serve as a shared services hub for online program recruitment, marketing, and student support; and eventually expand support to KSC and PSU. In response to a question about cost-benefit analysis, President Chilton stated that information from UCEA's recent assessment of UNH's online structure, along with estimated cost reductions and projected impact on enrollment, would be provided to trustees.

Adjournment

There being no further business or discussion, the meeting adjourned at 4:40 p.m.
